### Latest Updates:

#### Local:

- Waste Management provides helpful tips for when there is heavy wind such as:

  - o Removing carts immediately after they are serviced.

# County:

- Dr. Barbara Ferrer, Director of Public Health reported a slight increase in cases coinciding with the
  reopening of serval sectors and gatherings associated with the celebrating of the Lakers and Dodgers
  victories. There has been an increase in testing positivity percentage overall. Dr. Ferrer reported that Los
  Angeles County has the tools to decrease the positivity rate but reiterates social distancing and face
  coverings remains prudent.

#### State:

- Governor Newsom issued an <u>executive order</u> to:
  - o Create a process for issuing temporary encroachment permits enabling commercial activities in the state right of away.
  - o Allow people of 70 years of age and older to renew their drivers' license by mail.
  - Extending provisions related to deadlines for the payment of real estate license application, renewal fees and continuing education requirements for licenses.
